

The Sisters of Providence had long wanted to locate their northwestern headquarters in Edmonton, as it would be central to their ministries in the provinces of British Columbia and Alberta, and the territory of Yukon. In 1964, they began the construction of Providence Centre, building it larger than required for their own needs because Most Rev. Anthony Jordan, D.D. OMI, Archbishop of Edmonton, asked them to provide space for conferences for Religious in formation and seminarians and for housing for retired priests. From the beginning, this attention to hospitality, already an identifying element in the Sisters' ministry and lifestyle, was a strong flavour of the ministry in Edmonton.

Architects J.A. Cawston and Associates of Calgary, and contractors, The Foundation Company of Canada Ltd. completed the building in December 1, 1965. The Sisters, including the novitiate and the infirmary, moved in between December 1, 1965 and February, 1966.

Archbishop Anthony Jordan, OMI who was eager to see the building in operation, officiated at the turning of the sod in April 1964; the blessing of the altar in December 1965; the erection of the cornerstone; the blessing of Providence Centre; and the blessing of the

chapel in May, 1966.

The heart of the building is the chapel. Black granite, white marble, terracotta brick, cedar, and oak contributed to its solidity and beauty. The stained glass windows, designed by Mr. Karl W. Lengauer of Avanti Art Glass Co., Calgary give a cool sense of serenity to the light.

The first annual retreat took place in April 1966 beginning a ministry of providing retreats, spiritual conferences, and spiritual direction which grew until it became a major focus in the building.

By 1980, the requirements for Providence Centre had changed and extensive remodelling reallocated space in 1983 to meet both the administrative and housing needs of the Sisters and the ecumenical ministry of spiritual growth in Providence Renewal Centre, in the renovated north wing of the building.




A Drawing of Providence Centre Complex After 1982



Hence, this devotion became an integral component of the charism of the Sisters of Providence. Inside the oratory is a beautiful statue of the Pietà.

Many people who attend mass at the Chapel spend time beforehand or afterwards in the Oratory to pray the rosary.








Exterior Grounds
